Sometimes we like to use our imaginations and play a game called “what if”. What if the South had won the civil war? What would life in the divided United States be like today? What if the Interstate Road System had never been built? Would most commerce still move by rail? Since any time we tried to drive long distances we would still have to drive through every little town along the way, would people be doing a lot less traveling? It is kind of fun to try to imagine how things would be different in those situations. But, let's try another “what if”. What if there were no birth of Jesus to celebrate?

There would no doubt still be end of the year celebrations with the giving of gifts, and the gathering of friends, for this phenomena is common in a multitude of cultures at different times and different places. And actually, if there were no Christmas, no birth of Jesus, life on a day to day basis would hardly be any different.

It is actually quite easy to describe what it would be like if there had been no Christmas, no birth of Jesus. Scripture says, “It is appointed to man once to die and after that comes judgment.” At that judgment each individual will be required to give an account for their every thought, word, and deed, and because of the massive burden of sin that has been accumulated, every single individual would receive the condemnation they earned.

Some would go through life trying to ignore that terrifying reality. Some would go through life trying to do the best they could in the hope that somehow they might qualify. But it would all be to no avail, since God's law by which all will be judged demands perfection. The presence of one sin makes an individual unqualified and brings condemnation.

But Christmas has happened, Jesus has come, and the difference it makes is profound. Jesus came as the fulfillment of the promise God made at the fall of Adam and Eve. God promised that somehow he was going to fix the mess they had made. The Old Testament describes how God acted in history to make that plan a reality, until finally the plan culminated in the birth of Jesus. We know of course that the plan involved more than a birth. Jesus was God become flesh for the specific purpose of taking the sin of the world upon himself, which is what he did as he died on the cross. There, by the blood of his sacrifice, the debt of the sin of the entire world was paid.

Those who through faith confess Jesus as their Savior have all their sins forgiven. This means that when they come and give an account of their lives before God's bar of justice, there are no sins to condemn them. The reason there are no sins to condemn them is not because they never sinned, but because Jesus in his death removed them, and they will live with Jesus in heaven forever. The fact that Christmas happened means that we live daily without fear of an impending judgment and condemnation. We no longer fear death because we know that death is transformed to life.

Sadly, however, there are multitudes of people all around us living as if the “what if there were no Christmas” is true. They are carrying the full burden of their sins, and they will be judged and condemned. We have the message that will change their future. It is our privilege to

share that message with them so that as the Holy Spirit works faith in them, they too will know and live in the joy that Jesus the savior was born, and they too are saved.

Me, A Baby Boomer?

Last month I shared an article that focused on aspects of being “Senior Sensitive” and leading up to why there is reason to have an Older Adult Ministry here at St Paul. I also mentioned that it has taken me quite a long time to get over my dislike of the Baby Boomer title that has existed most of my life, and to the idea that I am a “Senior Citizen” or any other “older” related designations. However, that was several years ago and since then I have become aware of the large amount of resources on the subject, convincing me (and hopefully you) that it isn’t necessary to apologize for getting older. There are several topics I could write about (and will in future newsletters) but I feel that it would be good to say a few more words about why ministry with older adults is appropriate and important. Back when I began planning our first new ministry I received an article from one of my new newsletter sources that I think speaks to the concept defining the purpose of our planning as we begin to look at what may be beneficial to our “older” members here at St. Paul. What follows is part of that article.

Why should the church be concerned with older adult ministries? Wouldn’t it be wiser to spend our time and energy on children’s, youth or young adult ministries? After all, we often hear it said that the young people are the future of the church.

Richard H. Gentzler, Jr., author of *Aging and Ministry in the 21st Century*, reminds us that not only are people over 65 the fastest growing segment of the U.S. population, but they (we) are also essential servants in our congregations, in leadership, participation, giving and service. Older adults serve in many congregational leadership roles; they (we) are usually very active in congregational events; they (we) tend to give the higher percentage of income to support the church’s mission; and they (we) have more time to serve the church and community.

Perhaps, then, we should say that the future of the church is in the hands of our older adults. Well, of course, we want to say it is actually in the hands of the Holy Spirit, but older adults play a significant role in shaping the church’s ministry through their leadership and service. “Older adults have much to give to the church, not least of which is the sharing of their wisdom, faith, and experience. If we want to revitalize the church today, older adults must be included in our vision.” (Gentzler, 13)

In other words, ministry with older adults is important not only for the benefit of older adults themselves, but also for the very mission and renewal of the wider church.

Of course, that article is already almost three years old, but the points made are still as relevant as when originally written.

By the time you get this Messenger, a survey should have been received by all members age 55 and older, allowing an opportunity to express interest in this ministry to older adults, and to share some thoughts of what might be of interest going forward. If any younger members would like to

see the survey, or even share some thoughts by completing it, feel free to let me know and I will be happy to get you a copy.

One other point to mention is that my invitation for anyone interested in working with me to develop this new ministry has so far resulted in three willing and enthusiastic volunteers. They include Don Halbe, Mary Heeren and Anita Seehausen, who are forming the nucleus of our planning group with me, but more interested members are always welcome. Our first formal meeting is planned for right after Christmas, and by then we will have hopefully received a meaningful number of survey responses.
