## From the Pastor

As we turn the calendar to November, we realize that another year is about over, and as a year ends we naturally tend to reflect on all that has all happened. As we do that, most of us will identify many good things: the birth of a child or a grandchild, a wedding, a graduation, a new job, a successful knee replacement. At the same time, we will identify many not so good things: a beloved pastor being suddenly taken to life eternal, a divorce or major family tragedy, a diagnosis of acute kidney failure, a lost job.

November is also the month of Thanksgiving Day, which marks the start of the holiday season. On Thanksgiving Day, our nation is supposed to reflect and give thanks. It is significant that our Thanksgiving is inevitably coupled to our reflections of what has happened in the past year. If our reflections of the past year seem to be predominantly not so good things, then maybe Thanksgiving becomes difficult, perhaps only being thankful it wasn't worse.

This illustrates the key issue regarding Thanksgiving. What is the basis for which we give thanks? Is it no more than how happy we are with how life has gone for us this past year? If that is the basis, then for some, there won't be much thanks in Thanksgiving, and it will be a depressing time. However, for those of us who confess Jesus as our Savior, the basis on which we give thanks is totally different.

While we know that the God who created all things also cares for them and sustains them, which includes all of fallen mankind, that is not the basis. Rather the basis for which we give thanks begins with our relationship with God and why our relationship with Him is important. The reason our relationship with God is important is because of this thing we call death, a reality that touches everyone, and the ultimate question of what comes next.

The answer what comes next, of course will vary, depending on who we ask. Some simply say death is the end; there is nothing next. Others might say death is part of an upward spiral. Each individual goes through a series of incarnations until eventually they ascend the heights of heaven. The Scriptures leave no doubt what comes next. What follows death is that every individual is called to give an account before God of all that has ever been said, thought, or done. To have failed to measure

up to God's standards is to be unfit to be in God's presence and to be condemned to everlasting punishment.

But that is not the whole story. The Scriptures also make clear that God has provided a means of escape from this punishment that is earned by sin. This gives us a totally different future. The means of escape was that God's Son, the second person of the Trinity, became one of us in order that we might have these sins forgiven. We have become fit for God's presence, and taken to live with him forever.

For this reason, we are able to give thanks always in this life, no matter what else is happening. We can give thanks because our relationship with God is secure. Even though it may be that our lives are dominated by the not so good things, the promise of God is that none of these things has the power to separate us from his love. We have Jesus as our Savior, and through Jesus, we will live forever in the presence of God.

## Can Older Adult Ministry Work at St. Paul?

Last month I shared some thoughts about my belief in the place of an Older Adult Ministry here at St. Paul. I mentioned about the invitation by my former pastor to begin working on such a ministry. At that time I started to think about my need to admit I am a "Baby Boomer". It's a title I have disliked most of my life, but I have been getting over that. I have also tempered my reluctance of the idea that I am a "Senior Citizen", and any other "older" related designation. Since my first experience with beginning to work on developing an "Older Adult Ministry", and as I have continued to research the surprisingly large amount of resources, I am learning that it isn't necessary to apologize for getting older. If you remember, last month I mentioned that if you are younger than 50 that is a temporary condition that heals with time.

My point with this article is not to promote getting older – I will do more of that in future articles. What I do want to promote this month is the coming Older Adult Survey that should reach everyone who is at least 55 years old. (If anyone younger would like to share thoughts, I would welcome your responses too.) My plan is to mail the surveys within the next two or three weeks, after which it will be my challenge to compile the information received. Watch for the survey and please take the time to give your thoughts and ideas.

One other reference to last month's article involved a request for anyone interested in working with me on a focus group (rather than thinking of it as a committee) to consider how an Older Adult Ministry might look here at St. Paul. This doesn't need to be a life-long commitment, but how this ministry touches our members needs to reflect more than just my interests and ideas. I am hoping and praying that there are a few to several members in the congregation who would like to be part of laying the foundation for what hopefully will be a meaningful and beneficial ministry to the older adult population of St. Paul.

## **State of the Call Process**

Thanks to all those in the congregation who submitted names of pastors for consideration to become the new pastor at St. Paul. We have received the names of 17 eligible individuals. These names have now been submitted to our Southern Illinois District Office, along with our completed self study document. In addition, President Scharr will add names of individuals whom he feels would fit the needs of the congregation. These names, the ones submitted by the congregation and the ones suggested by the district president, will be the call list. The district president will provide the required information so that our call committee can consider all of this information and eventually bring recommendations to a special voters' assembly, which will meet in early 2018.

We should have the information we need from the District Office by the end of November. At that point the call committee, which consists of the elders, the chairman and vice chairman of the congregation, the circuit visitor, and the vacancy pastor, will determine the process by which it will establish, from the call list, and recommend a slate of individuals who seem to best fit the needs of the congregation. The actual call of the new pastor will take place at a special meeting of the voters' assembly.

## St. Paul's Braille Crew

Lutheran Braille Workers (LBW) is celebrating 75 years in ministry to people who are blind or visually impaired. Throughout these years, our congregation and our volunteers have joined with LBW to reach out with the saving Word of God in Braille, Audio and Specialized Large Print. St. Paul's first crew started in November, 2010.

Here are some of the steps in preparing the Braille Bibles. After the pages are numbered and binding holes are punched, the pages are inserted into the plates. The plates are marked to indicate where the top of the paper should line up for top margins, and the punched holes are lined up evenly outside the edge of the plate. The paper is punched with Braille letters on both sides for reading. It takes two workers to perform this task.

Preparation continues on putting the English Standard Version (ESV) of the Bible into Braille, using the new UEB Braille code. With production of LBW's Specialized Large Print ESV Bible underway, preparation on a second version, intended for correctional institutions, continues.

Again the group produced six copies each of Psalms Vol. I and Vol. II.
